HOUSING

Home to the oldest public housing estate in Singapore built in the 1920s by the Singapore Improvement Trust (SIT), Tiong Bahru stands as testament to the colonial influence in Singapore's governance. Block 55 was the first SIT block built in 1936! Its monthly rental costs were really high, which made it inaccessible to the masses.

OUR FIRST CC!

Singapore's first community centre is located in Tiong Bahru!

In 1948, the residents of Tiong Bahru formulated a plan to build a community centre which would assist and facilitate the progress of Tiong Bahru as an estate. The centre was officially opened in July 1951 by Duncan Robertson. It held weekly film screenings and various entertainment events for its residents.

THE FIRST PUBLIC HOUSING BUILDING WITH AN AIR RAID SHELTER

In 1939, SIT constructed an air raid shelter at Block 78 Chuan Guan Street located in Tiong Bahru. This was the first public housing building in Singapore with an air raid shelter and it still stands as a remnant of the war history associated with Singapore. The shelter could fit about 1,600 people at one time! What makes this place truly unique is its modern-day existence as the only remaining pre-war air raid shelter in Singapore.


Tiong Bahru Photowalk!

Golden Hour Glow!


Golden hour refers to the hour after sunrise and before sunset. The warm, golden glow is ideal for both portrait and landscape photography.

Present: Tiong Bahru Market & Food Centre

Completed in 2005, the Tiong Bahru Market & Food Centre's latest revamp sees itself having a two-storey building fitted with user-friendly features such as lifts and escalators. The first level houses the fresh market while the second is home to delectable local dishes such as *chwee kueh*, *mee siam*, and let's not forget a warm cup of soybean milk. With a large central garden courtyard, you can even take a quick breather and a picture or two while you're at it!

Past: Seng Poh Road Market

The market only had "Tiong Bahru" in its name from 1993 onwards. Opened in 1951, it was originally named Seng Poh Road Market after the street it was on. The market sheltered a large number of street hawkers who served the expanding community in Tiong Bahru. Interestingly, the market also doubled up as a "Town Hall" of sorts-hosting meetings and even rallies in its early history!






